

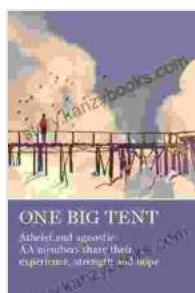

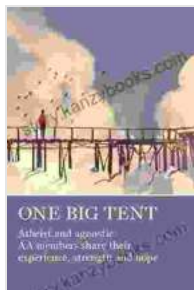
If you are struggling with alcoholism, please know that you are not alone. There are people who want to help you, and there is a way to recover.

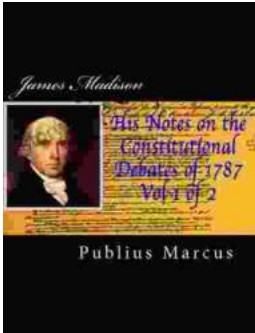
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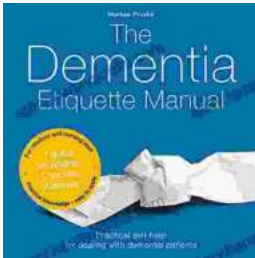
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
